



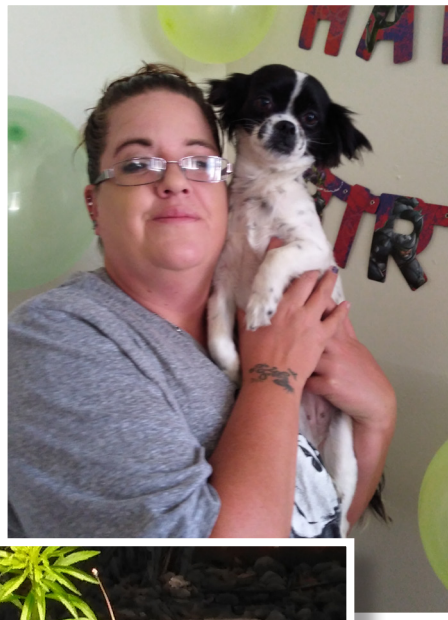

How Microchipping Saved My Dog



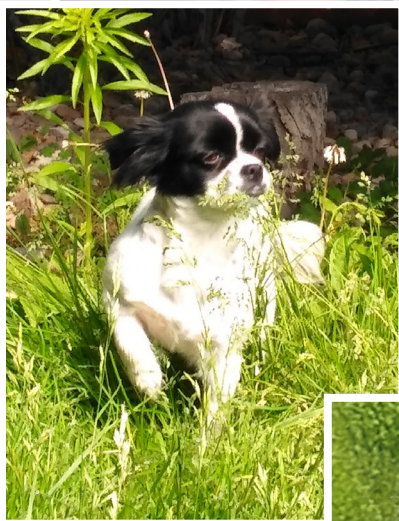

On September 4th, 2018, I pulled into a truck stop in Fountain, Colorado for gas. I had just returned into town after a trip out of state. Patches, my little dog likes relaxing under the driver seat. Considering her small size, that's a favorite hiding spot for her. After paying for gas inside, a woman ran up to me screaming that someone had stolen my dog. I looked at the lady and said "No, she's hiding under the seat." That's when my nightmare began. Patches was gone.

I called the local police. I filed a report on her microchip. I used social media. Several months had passed when my brother contacted me. He found an ad selling my sweet Patches. I emailed the ad with no response. I never gave up hope.

Finally, a lady contacted me on Facebook. She said her ex-boyfriend had posted the ad. She also told me where I could locate Patches. It was an address in Johnson City, Tennessee. I called the police in Johnson City. I explained my story of how she had been stolen and that I needed for them to do a welfare check, and let them know that she was micro chipped. I had been searching for almost a year.

An officer returned my call two (2) hours later. Senior Animal Control Officer Wayne Thomas had my dog. He had saved my Patches. She was now safe at the WCJC Animal Shelter. I drove from Colorado Springs to Johnson City the next day, where I was greeted with open arms. Chipping her proved she belonged to me. Chipping brought my baby home. I want to send a special thank you to Officer Wayne and his wife for their kindness and support. I will always be grateful!

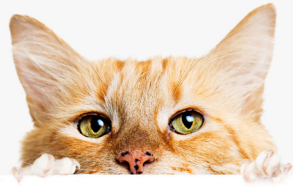


WE MICROCHIP – ONLY \$20

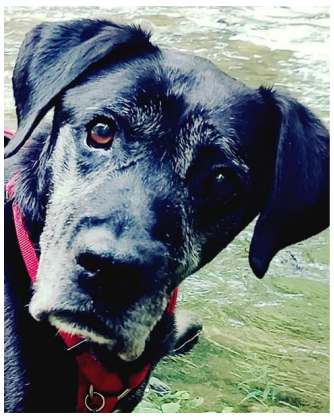

What we learned was Jake adapted to indoor life quickly, has a voracious appetite, loves car rides, long walks, getting wild during baths, loves playing with two young rambunctious girls, and continues to find great playmates along the way. We continue to discover his stubbornness beneath his loving and mellow soul.

So we decided to create a Facebook page dedicated to Jake called "A new leash on life for Jake". His first outing was to PetSmart where he promptly showed us the toy he wanted by yanking it out of the bin and dropping it on the floor at our feet. Cats come and go through the doors of the WCJC Animal Shelter every day. Every now-and-then one cat steals your heart. For me that happened on 01/23/19. Stripes was supposed to be a TNR (trap-neuter-return method for feral cats) cat, but he kept making his way back to the shelter. After the second time I decided to keep him here and find him a new home. Stripes likely had spent his entire life outside so he was not accustomed to being petted and given attention. Every day for months, I would sit in front of his cage and give him treats. Eventually he trusted me and let me pet him. He was such a talker, when he would hear my voice he would meow for me. He was eventually moved to the adoption floor. When I met Vicki and showed her how he would carry on a conversation with me, she was hooked. 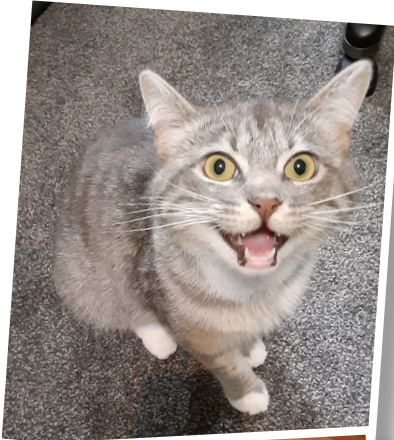

MEDICAL Update



A female cat was brought into the shelter with an injury, so was sent to the vet immediately. She was started on antibiotics and received hydrotherapy every day. The vet advised that her tail would have to be amputated. However, the cat was in such bad health, we provided supportive care to get her stronger for surgery.

Unfortunately, the hydrotherapy caused the tail to sluff off and expose the bone even more. She was sent back to the vet and the surgery was performed. Chris Martin, a former WCJC Animal Shelter employee now works at the Veterinarian's office where the cat had surgery. *Tammy Davis, WCJC Animal Shelter Executive Director.*

Mira, a silver tabby was in very bad shape when she arrived at the WCJC Animal Shelter. Her tail was degloved (the skin had completely fallen off) exposing muscle and bone. Despite her serious injury, she was extremely friendly and wanted nothing more than to be loved. Her gentle cries for attention and nuzzles made me fall for her almost instantly. She had surgery to remove all of her tail except one vertebra which left just a nub where her tail had been. After surgery, she was the same as ever; loving and wanting attention. With her recovery, she became bolder and louder with her attention-seeking, melting the hearts of all that were around. It has been several months from surgery and she has all of her hair back and is completely healed. She lives with her two new brothers and a sister that have taken an extreme interest in this newcomer. They play and run around the house chasing and bopping each other. She became part of the family with swift ease. I am so happy that she is a part of my life and I can't imagine what life would be like without her.

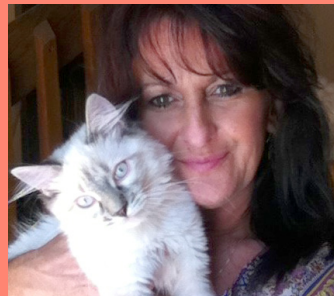

Did you know spring kicks off a phenomenon known as "Kitten Season"? If you are like me and love kittens, this sounds like it would be the best time of the year. Unfortunately, if you work in a shelter or rescue, it is anything but that.

Typically, kitten season starts in May and runs through October.

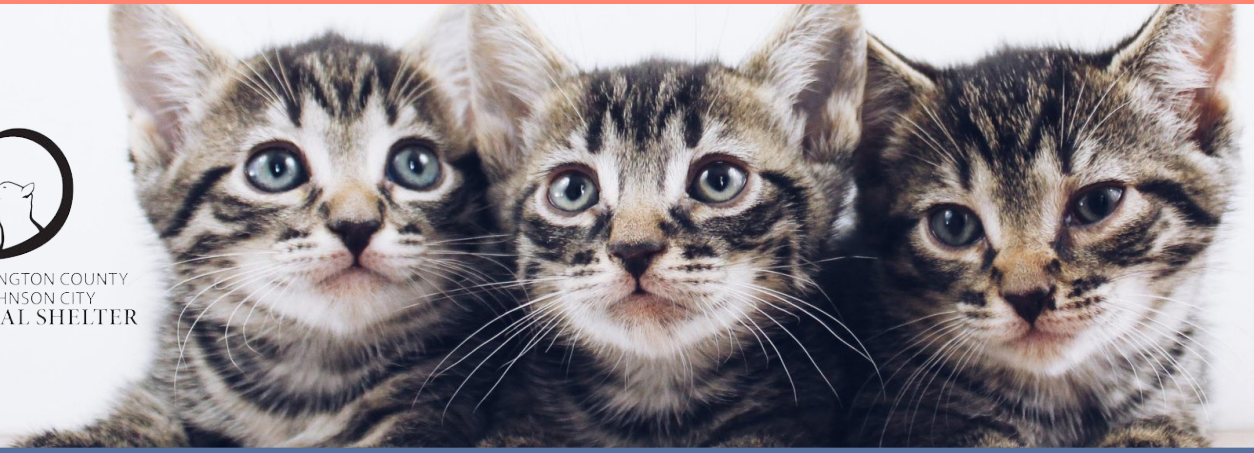
A female cat can become pregnant at five months of age and have several litters of kittens each year. With each litter averaging 6-8 kittens, that can be 12-18 kittens per year from one female cat.

PLEASE SPAY/NEUTER YOUR CAT OR CATS!

Space is limited in any shelter; the huge increase of kittens during this time of year is extremely stressful on those involved. Fortunately, we have a foster program that helps reduce the number of kittens in the shelter. Kittens need to be fostered until they are over 8 weeks old and weigh more than 2 pounds. THINGS TO Know

Microchips Help Reunite Families

Microchips greatly increase the chance that pets will be reunited with their families if they are lost or stolen. When an animal is found and taken to a shelter or veterinary clinic, one of the first things they do is scan the animal for a microchip. If they find a microchip, and if the microchip registry has accurate information, they can quickly find the animal's owner; but, a microchip only works if its registration information is accurate.

Once your pet is microchipped, there are three things you need to do: 1) make sure the microchip is registered; 2) ask your veterinarian to scan your pet's microchip at least once per year to make sure the microchip is still functioning and can be detected; and 3) keep your registration information up-to-date. If you have ever moved, or changed phone numbers or other contact information, make sure you have submitted updated information to your pet's microchip registry.

To check and update a registration, you'll need your pet's microchip number. If you don't have that easily accessible at home, your vet can scan your pet's chip for you. See www.petmicrochiplookup.org.

If you do not yet have your pet microchipped, there is no better time than now. Once chipped the registry is FREE. Please schedule an appointment with your vet.

DOGS

- 22% of lost dogs without microchips that enter shelters are reunited with their families.
- 52% of microchipped dogs are reunited with their families.

CATS

- 2% of lost cats without microchips that enter shelters are reunited with their families.
- 39% of microchipped cats are reunited with their families

NOTE: For microchipped animals that were not returned to their owners, most of the time it was due to incorrect owner information (or no owner information) in the microchip registry database – do not forget to register and keep your information updated!

MICROCHIP YOUR PET

Microchips don't replace a tag and collar, but they can make all the difference when it comes to getting your pet back.



Did You Know?



1 in 3 family pets will get lost



But only about 6 out of 10 microchips are registered



Microchipped dogs are more than twice as likely to be returned to their owners.



Microchipped cats are more than 20 times as likely to be returned to their owners.

When a microchipped pet isn't returned home, it's usually due to incorrect or missing owner information in the microchip registry.

In 2015, HomeAgain reunited **227,274 pets**



To date, HomeAgain has reunited over **2,000,000 pets** with their owners

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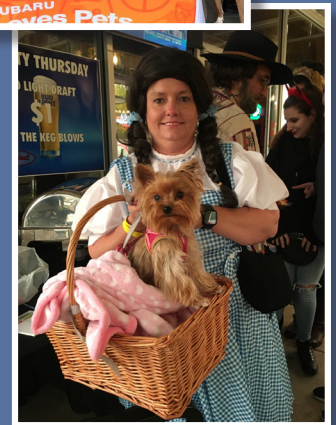
